Dear families,

NAPLAN time has arrived.

First and foremost, I would like to acknowledge that NAPLAN is a valuable tool to help us assess our student progress in literacy and numeracy. But it is just one of several data sets that we use to get a bigger picture of how our students are progressing with their learning. Your child's teacher knows your child and is tailoring learning for them. As teachers, we value the whole child and know that NAPLAN cannot measure some of the very important aspects of our students' growth such as their creativity or their critical thinking skills. It does not measure their kindness, their empathy or their integrity and humility – and we know that our students possess those qualities in bucket loads.

This year, to give our students optimal conditions while completing the NAPLAN assessments, both Mrs Hitti and Mr Hade will be with the students, supporting them with technical issues that may arise, and the general administering of the test. While they cannot help students with the actual answers, just having their regular class teacher in the room with them will ensure a familiar environment.

We hope that all students are present on the scheduled testing days, but there will be catch up sessions for those who are unavoidably absent.

Please help us to help your child by:

- ensuring they've had a good breakfast on the day
- reinforcing that NAPLAN is not something to worry about
- reassuring them and reminding them that we care about them, we value them, and that we know they are all amazing little humans

We are beyond proud of each and every one of them.

Behaviour code for students

Information for students and parents or carers

NSW public schools are committed to providing safe, supportive, and responsive learning environments for everyone across a range of settings. We teach and model the inclusive and safe behaviours we value in our students.

In NSW public schools students are expected, to the best of their ability, to:

• show respect to other students, their teachers and school staff and community members

- follow school and class rules and follow the directions of their teachers
- strive for the highest standards in learning
- act in a courteous and respectful way that makes all members of the school community feel valued, included and supported
- resolve conflict respectfully, calmly and fairly
- meet the school's agreed uniform policy or dress code
- attend school every day (unless legally excused)
- respect all property

• be safe and not be violent or bring weapons, illegal drugs, alcohol, vapes, e-cigarettes or tobacco into our schools

- not bully, harass, intimidate, or discriminate
- against anyone in our schools.

Schools take action in response to behaviour that is

detrimental to self or others or to the achievement of high-quality teaching and learning.

All students have a right to:

- safety at school
- access and fully participate in their learning

• be treated with respect by other students, teachers and school staff

• express their views, set goals and selfadvocate.

The principal and school staff, using their

professional judgment, are best placed to maintain discipline and provide safe, supportive and responsive learning environments and apply an appropriate action when students are not meeting these expectations. The department is responsible for the provision of a policy framework and resources such as legal issues bulletins, access to specialist advice, and professional learning to guide principals and their staff in exercising their professional judgment. In this context, the NSW Government and the Department of Education will back the authority and judgment of principals and school staff at the local level.

Behaviour code for students: Student actions

Promoting the inclusion, learning, wellbeing, and safety of all students in NSW public schools is a high priority for the Department of Education.

We implement teaching and learning approaches

across a range of settings to support the development of skills needed by students to meet our high standards for respectful, safe and engaged behaviour.

To meet the expectations set out above, students in NSW public schools, to the best of their ability, should adhere to the following principles.

Respect

- Treat one another with dignity.
- Communicate and behave courteously.
- Act and work cooperatively with other students, teachers, and school staff.
- Develop positive and respectful relationships.
- Value the interests, ability and culture of others.
- Respect the learning needs of other students.
- Dress appropriately by wearing the agreed school uniform or dress code.
- Take care with school property and the property of staff and other students.

Safety

- Model and follow school and class rules and expectations around behaviour and conduct.
- Negotiate and resolve conflict.
- Be aware of and take responsibility for how their behaviour and actions impact others.
- Care for self and others.
- Be safe and help others to make safe choices that do not hurt themselves or others.

Engagement

- Arrive at school and class on time.
- Be prepared for every lesson.
- Actively participate in learning.
- Aspire and strive to achieve the highest standards of learning.

- staff will be timely, polite and informative.
- professional relationships with school staff are based on transparency, honesty and mutual respect.

Communicating with our schools

Respectful communication is a right

In all workplaces people have the right to feel respected. Unacceptable and offensive behaviour has no place in our school communities.

To ensure the wellbeing of students, staff and the community in our schools, steps will be taken to address unacceptable behaviour. This may include restricting contact with the school community or, in more serious cases, referral to NSW Police.

Unacceptable behaviour may include but is not limited to:

- Aggressive or intimidating actions, such as violence, threatening gestures or physical proximity.
- Aggressive or intimidating language, including the use of obscenities, making sexist, racist or derogatory comments or using a rude tone.
- Treating members of the school community differently due to aspects such as their religion or disability
- Inappropriate and time wasting communication.
